<b>Teaching strategy</b>	Frontal and laboratory teaching		
	Teaching will mainly be delivered face-to-face with ample opportunity for teacher/student interaction, as a function of critical analysis, debate and request for clarification, making use of PPT and practical exercises. Formal cooperative learning will be used as a teaching methodology to promote collaboration and maximize teamwork.

Criteria for assessment and attribution of the final mark	During the exam, the teacher will pay attention to: knowledge of the contents of the exam program, as complete and in-depth as possible; ability to apply contents, ability to analyze, summarize and make interdisciplinary links; mastery of presentation. The method of verifying the expected learning outcomes is represented by the oral test. The vote is expressed in thirtieths. The criteria followed for the evaluation of the learning outcomes expressed out of thirty are:  <u>Insufficient: 0-17</u> Lack, incomplete and inadequate knowledge of the fundamental topics contained in the program, use of inappropriate vocabulary by candidates.  <u>Sufficient: 18-20</u> Sufficient knowledge of the core topics contained in the program and overall adequacy of the vocabulary used by the candidates.  <u>Fair: 21-23</u> Discreet knowledge of the fundamental topics contained in the programme, discrete ability to argue and connect the various topics, through the use of adequate vocabulary by candidates.  <u>Good: 24-26</u> Good knowledge of the topics contained in the programme, good in-depth analysis and critical skills, through the use of adequate vocabulary by candidates.
