Learning Objectives	The course aims to provide students with specific knowledge of the Christian tradition, particularly from a literary and historical perspective, and enable them to acquire the methods of philological analysis of early Christian texts.

Syllabus	
Texts and readings	Canonical, non-canonical and apocryphal. Letters, Gospels and Apocalypses from the Origins to the Peace of the Church. In the first part of the course, the main literary genres of early Christianity and their related themes will be analysed. The development of the main thought forms of early Christianity will then be described through the analysis of the texts they produced. The following part will focus on the literary testimonies that describe the varied doctrines of the different Christianities, their ideological structure, theories, diffusion and different reception, with particular attention to the relations with philosophical culture and pagan religiosity. Final exam and grading criteria	For the purposes of the evaluation, the degree of knowledge of the main issues related to historical research and the types of sources proper to Christianity of the origins and Late Antiquity and their interpretation will be verified. Particular attention will be paid to the ownership of language and the level of historical-literary skills on sources. The assessment will follow the following docimological parameters: - insufficient grade (<18): lack of basic knowledge and inability to provide a correct interpretation of texts; lack of knowledge of literary history. - sufficient grade (18-21): possession of basic literary knowledge; mainly correct treatment and interpretation of texts but conducted with imprecision and poor autonomy. - positive vote (22-24): possession of literary and historical knowledge of intermediate level; treatment and interpretation of texts correct, but not always precise and autonomous. - Good vote (25-27): possession of literary and historical knowledge of good level; treatment and interpretation of texts fully correct, sometimes not precise and autonomous. - excellent grade (28-30): possession of high-level literary and historical knowledge; correct treatment and interpretation of
