Prerequisites	The teaching of Latin Literature aims to provide students (who often come from institutions where the study of the Latin language is not contemplated) skills related to the literary history of the Latin world and to the understanding of Latin texts related to several literary genres. The objective is to foster a solid basic preparation on Latin civilization, pursued above all through the acquisition of a good command of the Latin language. The historical-literary knowledge, always starting from the texts read in the original language, focuses on the study of authors, works and literary genres. The student will start a critical study and will be provided with the main bibliographic tools for problematization and individual study. The teaching of the discipline helps to educate the student in a multidisciplinary approach and in a critical attitude towards the subjects being studied, which must also be framed in a wider cultural horizon, with their 'reuse' in modern art and literature and contemporary. Lectures, exercises and in-depth studies are moments of language training. During the lessons the student not only has the opportunity to acquire skills in Latin language, but also in the use of spoken and written Italian language: in fact, the study of Latin literary history and the analysis of documents in Latin facilitates and stimulates the ability to reflect also as regards the conscious use of the Italian language.	
Prerequisites	Knowledge of the Latin language is desirable; students who have not obtained a secondary school diploma can take advantage of the preparatory courses for the study of Latin made available by the CdL.	

Expected learning outcomes	The student should be able to place literary texts and documents in their context by recognizing forms, codes, genres, intertextual relationships; will have to show a mature ability of reading and interpretation of the Latin texts founded on an adequate competence of translation, as a moment of synthesis of the comprehension of the text in relation to the context. The historical-literary and linguistic competences acquired, the maturity and autonomy of critical judgment obtained will give the student the possibility of developing learning skills, both methodologically and bibliographically, which is fundamental to successfully face the complexity of the next level of studies. Participation in lectures, exercises and laboratories allows the student to put into practice the skills acquired and measure their learning skills.		
Evaluation criteria	The evaluation in the examination will take into account the solid knowledge of the historical development of Latin literature in relation to the main cultural currents and the genre system; the ability to establish diachronic relationships; solid linguistic mastery, verified through conscious translation and analysis of morpho-syntactic structures; the ability to analyze texts from a metric, and rhetorical-stylistic point of view.

Course contents	From the text to the context: starting from the translation and through the linguistic-stylistic analysis of a dossier of significant texts by the main authors of Latin literature, we aim to deepen the relationship between literary production and historical, socio-political and cultural context. Particular attention will be paid to the relationship between texts and literary genres in a diachronic perspective, with appropriate hints to the luck of patterns and motifs in subsequent literatures.
