Assessment criteria	The student must be familiar with the course topics and be able to contextualize historically and critic various artistic currents studied; and be able to analyze the works of art, describing their formal, st characteristics. Final exam and grading criteria	The final grade is out of 30. The minimum pass grade is 18/30. The oral exam consists of at least 2 questions for each of the 3 groups of topics concerning: the lead of art adopting the archive as an operative model (I), art criticism using archive to deconstruct conten (II), and curatorship and exhibition theories that have found their operative model in the archive. Each assess topic knowledge, critical-theoretical understanding of the contexts, command of the specialized interpretive skills, and the ability to apply the methodology studied to new topics.
