Content knowledge	Within the framework of the more general functioning of political,
content knowledge	institutional and extra-institutional life, cultural dynamics, power impacts,
	and social implications that develop between the fifth century B.C. and the
	fourth century A.D., the course proposes reflections on the plots and
	interweavings that characterize that phase of collective rethinking of the
	structures of the <i>res publica</i> and the dynamics of civic participation, running
	from the mid-second century B.C. to the Augustan age.
	Special regard is given to the forms of dissent and consensus, individual and
	collective, as expressed with respect to the political phenomena and events
	that follow one another in this century and to the transformation of the
	forms of the state that they induce. These processes will be followed through
	the reading of the ancient authors (Cicero, Varro, Plutarch, Appian, Cassius
	Dio) and the study of their tradition.
